### Rotary Foundation

Eight new Paul Harris Fellows were named and 32 Paul Harris Sustaining Members were enrolled. The club reached the 2400% plateau in total giving to the Rotary Foundation. Two Oak Ridge sponsored Foundation Scholars studied abroad; Blanche Dresner spends her year in Japan, and Marilyn Schuette studied in England. Charlie Kuykendall lead the District 678 Study Exchange Team to Australia. Jim Bomar, past President of RI, gave a moving talk on his experiences with emphasis on those relating to the Rotary Foundation.

### Summary of Outstanding Programs

Knoxville Mayor Randy Tyree was the speaker at our annual City-County Government Day. His subject was the “1982 World’s Fair”. The Morgan and Thomas brothers

played songs from blue grass to country. Kemmons Wilson, Founder and Chairman of the Board of Holiday Inns, gave us a list of his axioms for success. Jeannine Stollas discussed her participation in the 1981 Air Race Classic. Dr. Fred Martin, Dean of Administrative Services, discussed the impact of Roane State Community College on 500,000 residents in 15 counties of East Tennessee. Joe Davis gave an update on inflation and the need to increase the savings rate. Professor Bill Bass of the UT Anthropology Department helped us bone up on forensic techniques used to identify victims of fires. Ed Keen, KIEE vice president, spoke on "The World's Fair 1982". Chris Keim presented a program on "Rowing for the Handicapped". R. A. Langley, VP of Bechtel National, Inc., discussed the reasons for the location of its headquarters in Oak Ridge and the prospects for its headquarters in Oak Ridge and the prospects for it's becoming a significant force in the community. "Have We Licked Inflation and Recession" was the subject of a round table program by the World Issues and Understanding Committee. ### Special Activities

### Summary of Outstanding Programs

Bill Sergeant appeared on two occasions, first reviewing his year as Vice-President of Rotary International and, later, to give highlights of the proceedings of the council on legislation. The existence of the World's Fair in Knoxville presented us with the opportunity of obtaining a number of interesting speakers. Directors of International Pavilions appeared on four occasions to give us a rundown on their observations of the US and on conditions in their home countries. Alex Haley, author of "Roots", appeared before the club on Ladies Day and gave us a rundown on his Irish ancestry, which paralleled that of his African descent. It was an appropriate program for St. Patrick's Day. The annual City-County Day program was highlighted by the appearance of Robin Beard, a Tennessee member of the U.S. House of Representatives. As a consequence of the Department of Energy's solicitation of proposals for a new contractor for Oak Ridge plants, a number of key officials from prominent companies visited Oak Ridge and spoke to Rotary; among these were representatives from Martin Co., Signal Companies, Inc., E G & G, University of Tennessee, and Cabot Corporation. The Oak Ridge noon Rotary Club joined forces with the Breakfast Club for a Valentine's Day Dinner-dance on Friday, February 11. This is becoming an annual occasion for a pleasant social intermingling of the two clubs.

### Rotary Foundation

Six members of a Group Study Exchange team from Mexico spent a week in Oak Ridge and shared their experiences and songs with us. The concept of the 711 Club was initiated to encourage continued giving to initiate to encourage continued giving to the Rotary Foundation by existing Paul Harris Fellows. The Club will match funds donated and will select individuals to honor with new fellowships. Cathy Flanagan, a Rotary Scholar sponsored by our club, was welcomed home. The club successfully sponsored Nan Ho for a Rotary Foundation Scholarship to be carried out in the Orient in the 1986 – 1987 Rotary year. The Rotary Foundation plateau was increased from 3400% to 3800%. A major club support program for the RI Polio Plus Program was established. The Rotary Foundation Committee provided 50 Rotary clubs of District 678 with a VCR tape entitled “Polio 2005; immunizing the Children of the World”. Vickie and Steve Reddick, who were both Rotary Scholars in Ireland in 1983, spoke on their experiences as Rotary Ambassadors and their understanding of the Irish people.

### Special Activities

Representing our Club at the RI Convention in Las Vegas were Ralph Aurin, Dave Cope, Bill Sergeant, and Hank Stoner. The World Community Service Committee continued the support of a project establishing manufacturing facilities for orthopedic implants in Bangladesh. Dr. Ron Garst, the principal medical missionary in this project, spoke to the club about his work. A new vocational service program was developed to provide training awards in career areas not requiring a college education, thus demonstrating Rotary's commitment to dignify every worth occupation as an opportunity to serve. A \$750 – 1000 tradecraft scholarship will be offered to a graduating senior selected from candidates of district clubs. A revitalized Senior Citizens committee started a visitation program and a system to aid in transportation. In Youth and Education, the club recognized volunteers from the city who aided youth and supported numerous other activities, e.g., Student Government Day, business community scholars, a science essay contest, and fund-raising support for the Children's Museum.

### Summary of Outstanding Programs

Randy McNally reviewed the activities of the Tennessee Legislature. Club member and District Governor, Dave Cope, discussed the goals and objectives of Rotary on the local, district, and national level. Dr. James Green discussed "Creative Aging". Bill Higdon, UT football recruiter, discussed the challenge of finding academically oriented football players. Not-for-profit hospitals and HMOs focused attention on the costs of health care. James Spicer of the Camelot Center for Emotionally Disturbed Children discussed the need to recognize and modify such behavior early in life. Former Governor Bob Ely and videotape presented Polio 2005: "For All the World's Children". Boyd Carter reminded us of the origin and meaning of Thanksgiving. We learned about a new adult game, "The Survival Game", much like "Capture the Flag". The Roane State Celebration Singers gave a special performance for Rotary Ann Day. Mindy Gehrs of Oak Ridge, one of the top 25 female swimmers in the US, and her ACAC coach, Matt Vogel, described the work of the ACAC and the rigorous training schedule. Koala Center for treatment of alcohol and drug dependency was the subject of a talk by John Dreader. The Oak Ridge involvement in SDI includes multimegawatt nuclear power plants in space, flywheel energy storage, and pulsed power and nuclear beam weapons. Lynn Stoner, daughter of club member Hank and assistant professor of Latin-American history at Arizona State University, talked on "Cuba Today". Representatives of ORHS spoke on their experiences with the Model UN program. Rachel Smith, Senior Secretary to the Controller, MMES, described the changes in the work environment of the secretary. Senator Sasser was the featured speaker at City-County Day. Dr. Tom Lester shared his experiences as a medical missionary in Haiti, Guatemala, and the Philippines. The annual awards of Business Community Scholarships were given to nine ORHS students for outstanding academic achievements. Gayle Ward, director of Vocational and Adult Education at ORHS, captured our interest with her program of vocational activities. David Bolling, Anderson County Executive, gave an overall view of Anderson County and the cooperation among the county, Oak Ridge, and major employers.

### Club Honors Received

Chris Keim was honored by appointment as the National Director and Volunteer Head Coach for Special Olympics Rowing. Nick Orlando was selected as one of the four Charter Members of the Oak Ridge Sports Hall of Fame. Despite a change in the method of awarding prizes at the District Conference (Successful in encouraging participation by all of the clubs in the district.) Oak Ridge managed to receive a first place award for our entry in the Vocational Service competition.

### Rotary Foundation Activities

New Paul Harris Fellows included Steve Herron, Fritz McDuffie, Tom Dunigan, Dave White, Bill Pollock, Neil Johnson, Bob Candler, and Betty Robinson, Charlie Whittle was chosen as Team Leader for the Group Study Exchange Team going from our district to District 418 in Mexico November 8 through December 13. Doug Ray, a reporter for

“The Oak Ridger”, was selected as a team member. The team interacted with 32 Mexican Rotary Clubs and attended 17 Rotary meetings in its four-week tour. Jim Bomar, past President of Rotary International and Trustee of the Rotary Foundation, spoke to us about the activities of the foundation, through which more than 16,000 people have served as international ambassadors during their year as Rotary Scholars. A comparable number have participated in group study exchanges, Health, Hunger, and Humanity grants have brought hope to many, Oak Ridge accepted a goal of raising \$30,000 for the Polio Plus Campaign.

### Special Activities

The third annual Youth Service Awards were given to volunteers of the year in each of seven organizations: Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts, Children’s Museum, Girl’s Club, Campfire, Big Brothers/Big sisters, and Boy’s Club. J. D. Johnson was honored with the eleventh annual Vocational Service Award for his service to the dental profession. Six scholarships were awarded to Oak Ridge High School students in the Business field.

### Summary of Outstanding Programs

Randy McNally, State Representative and Club member, reviewed the past year in the Tennessee State Legislature (and was later elected Senator). Former Governor Winfield Dunn gave an upbeat message about the future of Tennessee. Mayor Roy Pruett explained the proposed revision of the Oak Ridge city tax structure (which later passed), cutting the tax rate in half. Knoxville Mayor Kyle Testerman spoke on the subject of regional economic development. We began to receive visits, letters, and bulletins from the mythical Clinch River Rotary Club which seeks to exploit the legendary position of Oak Ridge vis-à-vis radiation and good humor. Dr. C. C. Lushbaugh, former Head of the Medical Division of Oak Ridge Associated Universities, gave us first hand information about the Chernobyl accident in Russia. Mrs. Edna Gossage Blue, one of the original Cumberland homesteaders, told us some of the history of the mid-30’s project and still lives in the house she and her husband homesteaded 52 years ago. David Fitzgerald discussed the Tennessee Innovation Center which assists fledgling businesses by furnishing services and space needed in the start-up phases. Lamont Carter reported on the activities of the Chamber of Commerce. Ms. Pat Kelly, director of public relations spoke about the East Tennessee Children’s Hospital, one of only four hospitals in Tennessee specializing in the needs of children. Our own Dr. Tim Gowder gave a lecture with accompanying videotape in color of this recent excursion into microsurgery as applied to the restoration of blocked Fallopian tubes with sutures much finer than a human hair. Mr. Al Von der Esch, President and General Manager of Boeing Tennessee, Inc., described Boeing’s commitment to Oak Ridge including the announced investment in an Automated Production Facility to be built at the west end of town. Three officials of the University of Tennessee described the new UT Library, one of the nation’s major research libraries, a leading interlibrary loan lender, and the only library to hold the papers of three presidents (Jackson, Johnson, and Polk). Members of the ORHS International Relations Club shared their experiences in preparing for and participating in the annual North American Invitational Model United Nations; they continued the tradition of the school in bringing home one of the six honor flags given out.

She told us of the major issues confronting Mexico and discussed her experiences as a high school student in Oak Ridge. Rudolph Tiu, from the Philippines, an exchange student in Harriman, related his experiences. Our club supported the Adopt-A-School program by formally adopting the Technical Career Center of the ORHS, becoming the first civic organization to participate in this program.
